As we celebrate Memorial Day, I'd like to take a minute to thank our brave men & women who served in the military. I am a proud veteran, as was my father before me during WW II. It was truly an honor to serve this great country. Thank you to my brothers & sisters in arms for your service. And to those who made the ultimate sacrifice, we honor

In other news, we had approximately 40 politicians come out to visit PARX from Harrisburg, our largest turnout ever! We gave all an up close and personal tour of two barns managed by Kate DeMasi and John Servis. We provided a behind the scenes view of all our hardworking men and women that it takes for a single trip to the Winners Circle. We then enlightened them about our after care program, Turning For Home, for our retired racehorses.

I then advised that the Commonwealth Of Pennsylvania is the only State Flag in the nation with two horses emboldened on it. Our flag represents that Pennsylvania is an agricultural state in which, without breeding & racing, it could potentially go bankrupt, as that's how important our industry is to the Commonwealth.

I felt it necessary to remind our esteemed politicians that the Racehorse Gaming Act was written in 2004 to protect horsemen - not the casinos. We derive our revenue stream by allowing the casinos to partner up with breeding & racing as we do not receive a single penny from the Commonwealth!

The Racehorse Development Trust Fund at its high water mark back in 2011/2012 brought in \$280,000,000 for our horsemen. Since then with casino expansion, adding table games, sports wagering and internet slot play in which we currently do not derive any income from the casinos, we've fallen on hard times!

In the last fiscal year, the RHDTF only brought in \$188,000,000, a decline of nearly \$100,000,000 for a 33% decrease. In order for Pennsylvania breeding and racing to be successful, we must be able to compete with our neighboring states in the form of purses offered to horsemen. I further explained that breeding and racing mattered because we provide 23,000 direct & indirect jobs; another \$1.6 billion dollars in annual economic impact across multiple sectors including agriculture, manufacturing & construction! We also generate \$68.8 million dollars in annual tax revenues via state income, sales, business & property taxes. We also help protect 1.3 million acres of open land which would be vulnerable to commercial development without breeding & racing because of our broad agricultural impact. Over \$721,000,000 by Pennsylvania's breeding & racing industry goes toward capital expenditures, wages/salaries & sales/services.

Last but not least, I said "please don't listen to your colleagues nor the casino lobbyists advocating that breeding and racing is a dying industry" as nothing could be further from the truth. Last month's 2025 Kentucky Derby peaked at a Record-Breaking 21.8 Million Viewers for NBC. Peacock achieved the highest traffic of all partnered streamers for the race. With the 151st Derby, NBC Sports had the largest streaming audience ever for a horse racing event, with an Average Minute Audience of 959,000 viewers. The network has achieved an average of more than 15 million viewers across all platforms for the last 10 of 12 Derbys. The only sporting event with a larger audience than the Derby is the Super Bowl. That's It! I ended by stating Mr. Hutt was willing, ready and able to come to Harrisburg to educate our legislators on how important breeding and racing is to the Commonwealth Of Pennsylvania. Until next time wishing you many winners!

GAMING EXPANSION AND DECLINES IN FUNDING TO



SUPPORT HORSE RACING, BREEDING

Decreasing Race Purses, Breeder Incentives Has Broader
Implications for PA Agriculture Sector



WHAT IS IT?

The Race Horse Development Trust Fund was created by Act 71 of 2004 (The Pennsylvania Race Horse Development and Gaming Act), legislation that legalized slot machine gaming in the Commonwealth with a primary intent to enhance live horse racing in the state.

WHY WAS IT CREATED?

The governor and legislature wanted to ensure that rural, agricultural areas of Pennsylvania benefitted from legalized gaming. They also realized that gaming expansion would adversely impact the handle, or wagering on horseracing, which traditionally funded racing purses and breeder incentives.

HOW IS IT FUNDED?

The fund is supported through a casino assessment that is calculated based on the slots gross terminal revenue at the state's six Category 1 casinos. The assessment, divided among all Category 1, 2, and 3 venues, has declined from 12% to 8.7% due to decreases in Category 1 slots revenue. Act 42 of 2017 states that the assessments "are not funds of the Commonwealth" and that "the Commonwealth shall not be rightfully entitled to any money" from the trust fund.

DID YOU KNOW?



Because horsemen demand the top quality hay for their horses, the industry sets the market price for hay sales. The average horse eats 15 to 20 pounds of hay per day. The industry also drives straw sales, which is used for bedding.

The state's mushroom industry is reliant on PA's racetracks, breeding farms, and racing stables as a cost efficient source of manure for their crops.





Horsemen in the racing and breeding industry are major customers of the state's feed mills. For example, Brandt's Feed Mill in Lebanon, PA produces 4,000 tons of horse feed each year, 90% of which is sold to thoroughbreds.



Horsemen are key customers for equine transportation businesses, PA construction companies that build barns and fences, and manufacturers such as Farmco, a producer of horse feeders.

Pennsylvania is home to hundreds of thoroughbred and Standardbred horse breeders, including the 3,000-acre Hanover Shoe Farm, the world's largest Standardbred breeder. On average 900 horses live on the farm, cared for by 80 employees. Each year, Hanover buys 3 million pounds of straw, 4 million pounds of hay, and a half-million dollars' worth of feed from the local area, and ships over 9 million pounds of manure and hay to PA mushroom growers.

has been transferred from the RHDTF to the General Fund since 2011. These funds were originally intended solely to fund purses and breeder incentives. The transfers and cannibalization from other forms of gaming have shaken confidence in the industry.

LEGISLATORS TOUR AT PARX'S BACHSTRECH

On May 20, 2025, the PTHA, along with the PA Breeders Association, the PA Equine Coalition, and Wojdak, organized a tour of the Parx stables, where PA senators and legislators could experience firsthand what our equine industry is all about. During an engaging discussion moderated by trainers John Servis and Kate Demasi, they got a glimpse into the life of a trainer while learning about the community's involvement in horse racing. They also learned more about our proud TFH program. The PTHA and the PA breeders aim to demonstrate to our legislators how vital our industry is to Pennsylvania and how it ties in with the progress of our state. We thank everyone who attended the tour and those who made it possible.










Protecting the State's Agriculture Sector

The Challenge

- Pennsylvania's horse racing and breeding industry is facing a major crisis due to a significant decline in funding for purses and breeder incentives. Since FY11-12, funding for the Race Horse Development Trust Fund (RHDTF), which funds purses and breeder incentives, has decreased by 33% from \$280 million to \$188 million.
- This decrease is due to the cannibalization of Category 1 slot machine revenues, which have seen 5% to 10% annual declines, due to competition from other forms of gaming like online slots and table games, VGTs, sports wagering, and Category 4 casinos, as well as games of skill
- Declines in purses and breeder incentives are forcing horsemen to send their horses to other states to race and breed. This has a spiral effect on the broader agriculture sector such as hay, straw, mushroom, and grain farmers; feed mills; veterinarians; tack suppliers; and others who rely on horsemen and breeders.
- Declines have forced PA's six race tracks to cut race days by 286 days per year (28%) since the 2010s. Thoroughbred breeding numbers have declined by more than 50%.
- The expressed intent of Act 71 of 2004, which legalized casino gambling in PA, was to enhance live racing and breeding, as well as ensure that rural communities and the agriculture sector benefited from gaming.





The Solution

Without a stable level of funding, tracks will continue to cut race days and breeders will continue to opt to invest in other states where the industry has long-term financial stability. This will have a destabilizing effect on Pennsylvania's larger agriculture sector. If the Gaming Act is opened by the legislature, the Pennsylvania Equine Coalition asks legislators to stabilize funding for the horseracing and breeding industries by restoring funding of the RHDTF to \$235 million and ensure annual that the funding remains level to provide fiscal certainty to small business owners and investors. This additional funding could come from a portion of online slots revenues or an allocation from overall gaming revenues, which doubled in the past 14 years while funding for purses and breeder incentives dropped 33%. Some casinos are advocating for legislation to remove the minimum 1,500 slot machine requirement at Category 1 casinos. Because the industry is reliant on Cat 1 slot machine revenues to fund the RHDTF, it is imperative that any reduction in slot machine levels be accompanied with a new funding source for the racing and breeding sector.

Why Horseracing and Breeding Matters

Trainers, if you're turning 65 in 2025 and are fully vested in our non-qualified pension plan, there's something important you should know:

According to IRS rules, once you hit 65, your pension income is considered "constructively received." That means it's treated as taxable income—even if you don't take any money out of the plan. You'll get a 1099 for the full balance at the end of the year.

Parx Racing horses take on the Jersey Shore at Monmouth Park

Kentucky Outlaw - \$100,000 Long Branch Stakes Winner - May 10th 3 year old colt Kentucky Outlaw secured a decisive 1½-length victory in the \$102,000 Long Branch Stakes, providing owner-trainer Felissa Dunn with her first career stakes win. Despite previous gate issues, Kentucky Outlaw overcame a hesitant start, quickly catching up to the field and taking the lead with jockey Paco Lopez. The colt completed the one mile and 70 yards in 1:41.06 over several Parx based invaders, earning a free entry and start fees to the Grade 1 NYRA Bets Haskell Stakes on July 19. - May 10th

Takethemoneyhoney – \$100,000 Serena's Song Stakes Winner - May 11th 4 year old filly Takethemoneyhoney delivered a thrilling victory in the \$100,000 Serena's Song Stakes with jockey Éliseo Ruiz aboard to narrowly defeat Catherine Wheel by a nose. The race featured a competitive field going 1 mile and 70 yards, including Grade 1 winner Power Squeeze, who finished third. Takethemoneyhoney's win was a testament to her tenacity and racing prowess. Trained by Mike Moore, owned and bred by Kasey K Racing Stable LLC, Michael Day and Final Turn Racing Stable IIC.

\$90,000 Spruce Fir Handicap - May 17th
Kate's Cuban Kiss, a four-year-old filly trained by Steven Krebs for owner/breeder Hidden Acres 4-D Farm, recently delivered a commendable performance in the Spruce Fir Handicap at Monmouth Park securing a strong second-place finish with jockey Samy Camacho to winner Summer's Comin going 6 furlongs for NJ Bred fillies and mares with a zippy final time of 1:10.34

Buccherino - \$100,000 Mr. Prospector Stakes Winner - May 26th

Buccherino delivered a commanding performance to win the \$100,000 Mr. Prospector Stakes at Monmouth Park, reaffirming his status as a top-tier sprinter. Ridden by Paco Lopez and trained by Alfredo Velazquez, the 4-year-old colt broke from the outside post and engaged in an early duel with Super Chow. Buccherino took command midway on the turn and held off late challenges from Subrogate and Dean Delivers to secure a one-length victory, completing the six furlongs in 1:09.47. Owned by Happy Tenth Stable and trained by Parx Racing Hall of Fame trainer Alfredo Velazquez.



A Game of Gratitude

The PTHA Turning For Home Golf Outing at Bensalem Country Club was more than just a beautiful day on the greens with laughter, sunshine, and a few wild swings—it was a moment of unity. Horsemen, owners, sponsors, and teammates stepped away from the hustle and came together with one shared purpose: to thank the horses.

It felt especially poignant this year. As Smarty Jones finally prepares to take his place in the National Hall of Fame, I could not help but reflect on what that horse meant to all of us—and what he continues to mean.

No Smarty, no passion. No Act 71. No Turning For Home. No pension program. No aftercare safety net. That horse was not just Pennsylvania's champion; he was the catalyst that built an entire support system for the very horses who give us everything.

The golf outing is fun, sure. But the message? The message is even better.

At Turning For Home, we have retired over **4,500 Thoroughbreds**. That is not just a number—it is proof. Proof that when owners, jockeys, and trainers believe in doing things right, the model works. It means something when a trainer walks into our office and says, "This one's not injured, just not trying anymore." It means they trust us to write the next chapter before the last one turns sour.

Because our retirement program is about timing, dignity, and respect.

It works because the people of Parx Racing have committed to it. They honor the \$100 per start, the \$35 per winning mount, and the principle that the horse always comes first. The barn culture here is evolving. We see it in the way our trainers approach conditioning, how quickly our teams respond to the horses, and the responsible retirements of horses that still have potential—not just physical but emotional—left to give in another discipline.

As we welcome new legislators and stakeholders to Parx this month, we proudly show them that aftercare is not an afterthought here. It is embedded deep in the stalls of our barns. Our intake process leaves no one behind. Our finances are transparent. Our partner farms are the best. Our return-for-life policy is real.

We do not just hand off horses—we follow through.

And we do all of it because we love the horses first.

When I first started this job, I remember the powerful title from Dr. Patty Hogan's talk: "Don't squeeze the lemon dry." Speaking to our horsemen on TFH Day, she meant not to run the horse into the ground. Stop injections that wear the cartilage out faster than they can heal. Listen to the horses and watch for signs. Pay attention. Know when they have given what they can. And if you don't know? Ask.

We don't have Superman's X-ray vision. That's why we rely on constantly improving diagnostics, skilled surgeons, and attentive horsemen who speak up when something seems off. When the exercise rider says a horse took a bad step, when a groom notices swelling, or when a trainer just feels like the fire isn't there anymore—that's when we step in, **before it** goes sour.

There's still juice in that lemon. And now, instead of pushing them past the point of no return, we're giving these horses the chance to do something more.

We're making lemonade. And Dr. Patty Hogan should be proud of that.

Looking ahead, Angel's dreams don't stop with exercise riding. "If God gives me the chance," he says, "maybe one day I'll be a jockey."

His advice to anyone thinking about stepping into the world of racehorses? "Don't think about it. Just do it. Follow the heart."
