Contacting Your Legislators Racing Needs Our Collective Voice

The Pennsylvania State budget season is in full swing, but this year will be different than most. Unlike prior years, we're not forced to fight to stop withdrawals from the Race Horse Development Trust Fund. Rather, we are challenged to obtain our fair share of gaming revenue if the legislature opens the State Gaming Act. Revenue from Skill Games, unregulated and untaxed devices that mimic slot machines and can be found in countless corner stores, bars, and restaurants, along with Online Slots could be used to bolster our industry.

In 2004, the Pennsylvania legislature passed Act 71, the Race Horse Development & Gaming Act which legalized casinos and allocated a share of physical slot machines to the racing and breeding industry. Since that time, alternative forms of gaming were approved that funded many areas – with the exception of racehorse and breeding development. Brick and mortar slot machines at casinos are on the decline as the younger generation turns to online slots which have seen revenues increase by leaps and bounds.

It is up to us – the individuals who make up the horse racing, breeding and broader agriculture sector – to fight for our fair share and secure the long-term future of our industry. 'We are Agriculture' and the horseracing and breeding industry is responsible for 23,000 jobs, \$1.6 billion in economic impact, and the preservation of 1.3 million acres of open space in Pennsylvania. Very few jobs nor economic impact are generated by online gaming. Please contact your state legislators as soon as possible! Please do not wait!

Horsemen's advisory from the Horseracing Integrity & Welfare Unit (HIWU) regarding Adenosine and Hemo 15.

In recent months, HIWU has adjudicated several cases under the Anti-Doping and Medication Control (ADMC) Program related to adenosine, a vasodilator, and Hemo 15, a foreign product that lacks FDA approval. Neither substance has any valid veterinary use in the racehorse.

Both substances are categorized as an SO Non-Approved Banned Substance and therefore are prohibited from Use in a Covered Horse or Possession by a Covered Person at all times. Hemo 15 and any compounded product mimicking Hemo 15, as well as any products containing adenosine, adenosine monophosphate (AMP), or adenosine triphosphate (ATP)* should be disposed of immediately.

As a reminder, the Presence, Use, Administration, Possession, or Trafficking of any Banned Substance is subject to a period of Ineligibility of up to two years, a fine of up to \$25,000, the disqualification of race results (as applicable), and public disclosure.

Rest Now or Rehab Later: The Value of Time in Managing Racehorses

At **Turning For Home, Inc.**, we're kicking off a new series designed to assist horsemen in maximizing both the longevity and profitability of their racehorses. One of the most important decisions any trainer faces is knowing when to step back and give a horse time—not after an injury, but before one. Choosing rest at the right moment is one of the most effective tools a horseman has for protecting both the horse and the business.

We hear it daily at intake: "He came back a little off. I think it's time." And that instinct is usually right. The challenge is recognizing the signs early enough to avoid crossing the line from manageable wear into serious injury. Horses tell us when they need time. Longer recovery after races, loss of appetite or condition, swelling that flares between works, or personality changes—getting grumpy, quieter, or more stressed—are all red flags. When performance starts tapering off without a clear explanation, that's the moment to stop and ask for diagnostics.

The veterinary data is clear. Studies show that nearly **90% of catastrophic breakdowns happen at sites where pre-existing wear** or injury was already present. Sesamoid fractures, tendon tears, and condylar fractures don't happen out of nowhere—they are the end result of accumulated micro-damage built up over time. This is exactly why regulators like HISA, veterinarians, and experienced horsemen are so focused on early detection and preventive management.

When horses do get hurt, the road back is long. A bowed tendon or suspensory injury typically means **six to twelve months off** at a rehab farm—at approximately \$1,000 per month. Even then, there's no guarantee of a full return to form, and the risk of re-injury remains high. Repairable fractures still require months away from training, careful rehab, and a slow rebuild. And chronic joint deterioration—"bad ankles" or knees—often signals the end of a racing career altogether.

By contrast, a simple rest period – **30 to 60 days at the farm** – costs the same **\$1,000 per month**, but without the physical and financial burden of major rehab. Horses come back fresher, sounder, and often mentally sharper. It's not just good horsemanship—it's good business. Horses that are managed with regular breaks statistically stay sounder, perform better, and last longer in racing. A major study of Thoroughbred trainers confirmed that horses given rest breaks earn **higher average earnings per start** than horses trained straight through. This reflects what old-school horsemen have known for decades: when in doubt, back off. Let them regroup, heal, and come back right.

It's also important to acknowledge that the current racing landscape has changed. There is no endless supply of horses. We are facing a real shortage of sound, race-ready horses. Buying another one isn't always a quick or easy solution. The cost to claim or purchase a replacement is a major, often unforeseen investment—and there are no guarantees that a new horse will be as sound, as honest, or as reliable as the one standing in your shedrow today. In many cases, the smartest money is spent protecting the horse you already know.

A prime example is local turf sprinter **Dubini**, trained by **Kate DeMasi** for **Pewter Stable**. After undergoing colic surgery—a career-threatening setback—he was given the necessary time off to recover fully. Not only did he return, but he came back strong enough to win the **\$100,000 Laurel Dash**, proving that time, patience, and proper management can lead to major success after adversity. Like many turf horses, Dubini also routinely got winters off—a longstanding management practice in racing that prioritizes rest and long-term performance. His career longevity is a perfect reminder that rest isn't lost time—it's an investment in future starts.

At TFH, we see the flip side every day. Horses that retire before major injury easily transition into second careers as the athletes they were bred to be. But many horses could also extend their racing careers if their connections stepped back early enough, before wear becomes damage. This isn't just about retirement—it's about smarter management while they're still in training.



This is the first in a series aimed at helping horsemen think differently about managing soundness, recovery, and performance. Our job isn't to tell you when a horse should retire—that's always the trainer's decision. But we are here to share tools, knowledge, and support to help make the best decision at the right time— whether that means rest, rehab, or retirement. **Turning For Home is backed for life—and so are the horsemen who use it.**

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For **Richie Vega Jr.**, the path to a career in horse racing wasn't always a straight one. Raised in Bensalem and a proud graduate of Bensalem High School, Richie once envisioned a future as an engineer, not working with majestic, 1,200-pound athletes. But life—and love—had other plans.

"I originally wanted to be an engineer," Richie admits. "But I started working summers as a hot walker for my dad, and once we got a few more horses, everything changed." After graduation, Richie joined his father, longtime trainer Richie Vega Sr., at Parx Racing. What began as a temporary job walking horses evolved into a full immersion in the world of racing. As the barn grew, so did Richie's responsibilities. He learned to groom, care for, and eventually ride horses—all under the steady guidance of his father. "The more I worked with the



horses, the more I fell in love and knew this is what I wanted to do," he says. "There's nothing like building a bond with them." They all have their personalities, and once you connect with one, it just grabs your heart. One of those horses was She Loves Munny, a chestnut filly bought as a two-year-old. She became more than just a runner in the Vega barn—she was Richie Jr.'s first grooming project until her retirement.

Over the years, Richie has become a jack-of-all-trades on the backside: groom, outrider, van driver, assistant trainer, and now, a student of the game with his sights set on taking the next big step: "Eventually, I want to get my trainer's license and start my business." Working alongside his father has been both a privilege and a challenge. "It's not always easy working with family," Richie laughs, "but there's no one else I'd rather work for. He's taught me what it means to work hard and be patient—because horses will teach you patience like nothing else."

He also credits the PTHA for supporting his journey. "The benefits they offer here are incredible. I was blessed to have two wrist surgeries covered, which let me continue doing what I love at full capacity." For Richie Jr., the racetrack is more than just a workplace. It's a classroom, a proving ground, and a place where dreams are beginning to take shape. "I hope one day I can accomplish the things my dad has and make him proud. Maybe one day, we'll both have our names in the Hall of Fame."

As he looks to the future, one thing is certain - Richie Vega Jr. isn't just following in his father's footsteps. He's blazing his own trail, one horse at a time.
